

Please note that there will be a meeting of the Enquiry Committee at 7.00 pm, so assistance would be appreciated in setting up the Lodge on the evening to allow the Enquiry Committee to take place. As regards the Divine Service, this is an important meeting in the calendar of the Lodge and I would encourage all to attend. Donations of sandwiches, cakes and biscuits to provide refreshments for our guests would be much appreciated.

On Wednesday 13th December, the Lodge has been invited to confer a Master Mason's degree at Lodge Sir Michael No. 989 and on Tuesday 9th January, we have been invited to confer an Entered Apprentice degree at Lodge Burns Dundonald No, 1759. I hope that you will all be able to support the Lodge on those occasions.

On Tuesday 16th January, the Lodge starts the year with the annual Glenny Memorial Lecture and this year, I have arranged for a talk by Brother Reverend Iain Ramsden, Past Grand Chaplain, who has written a series of books based on his experience as a Parish Minister, entitled "Tales of a Highland Minister". Brother Ramsden recently provided a talk to the Port Glasgow Old Boys' Union, which was both illuminating and entertaining and I would recommend the evening to you.

Turning to the subject of visiting, while I greatly appreciate when brethren turn out to support the Master and the Lodge, I am equally aware that I am retired and my family is grown and while I may have the time to attend other Lodges, some of my office-bearers have careers and young families which demand their time. Consequently, I will advise through the WhatsApp group where I intend visiting during the week ahead and if anyone can make it along, that would be great.

However, I would like to make up a plan for a more formal visiting structure where I would welcome as many of the brethren of the Lodge to attend. There are eight other Lodges in the Province and eight months in the Masonic Calendar. If we can organise a visit to one Lodge per month "en masse" then it provides a greater visibility of the Lodge. I will compile a list for visiting over the next few days but it is likely that the first visit may be to Lodge Doric Kilwinning No. 68 on Monday 18th December.

Finally, regarding new candidates, I am very conscious of the fact that if we do not gain the interest of new candidates at an early stage in their Masonic careers, we are likely to lose them as members within the first 18 months! In this respect, I would encourage all members to make our new candidates feel welcome. I would charge their proposers and seconders to make good their promise at the Enquiry Committee to support their candidates and especially by ensuring that they are encouraged to witness at least one other degree before they return for their own degree. It is not enough for them simply to appear having been tutored to answer a few questions – that is not sufficient preparation and it may well be that I will ask the Lodge to consider a rule that a candidate must have witnessed at least one other degree before he returns for his Fellowcraft or Master Mason's degree. Such an arrangement also encourages them to visit other Lodges and to get themselves known.

My thanks to Brother Iain for allowing me to "hog" this edition of "TT" and you brethren for hopefully taking the time to read through my "musings". Perhaps Iain might allow me some space in future editions or then again, maybe not!!!

Bro. Ewen MacLean



Ewen was born and bred in Greenock and worked for many years as a Compositor with the *Greenock Telegraph*. He was a keen sportsman, and, like his father, was an excellent and competitive runner. He was also a lifelong Morton fan.

At the young age of 33 he was diagnosed with Chronic Kidney disease and had his first transplant which served him well for 20 years. Ewen had to eventually drive to Glasgow for dialysis twice weekly for many years.

As a result of Ewen's own health issues, he became involved in many kidney charities, eventually working for Kidney Care UK for 12 years becoming its lead advocacy officer for Scotland and later became an ambassador for the charity. He was a high-profile member of the Scottish Renal Association and a hard-working fund raiser for its hospice in Clydebank. Ewen fought hard for kidney patients in Campbeltown to have their own Dialysis unit rather than facing a 6-hour journey to the Vale of Leven Hospital for treatment. This achieved, he was asked to officially open the unit.

Not content with all his work, he served on Largs Community Council and was Secretary of the Scottish Kidney Federation. He was also a founding member of the Patient Support and Advocacy Service.

Ewen's first wife Marion sadly passed away while they were on holiday in 2010 and he lost his only son Barry 4 years ago. He was then happily married to Sandra.

Bro Ewen's health has suffered over the last few years. He had another kidney transplant suffering sepsis in the aftermath of his operation and more recently scalp cancer had hold of him, but Ewen fought back every time.

Bro. Ewen was sadly called to the Grand Lodge Above on the 13th November 2023. He died suddenly in the I.R.H. after suffering stomach pains the day before.

Ewen joined Lodge Doric Kilwinning No. 68 on the 11th September 1978, Passed on the 25th September and Raised on the 9th October. It was due to Ewen having to attend hospital on Monday evenings for dialysis that in 2012 he affiliated to Lodge Greenock Kilwinning No. XII. Ewen was also a Charter named member of The Brisbane at Largs Priory and Preceptory instituted Feb 2010.

Annual Installation Tuesday 21st November 2023

The Lodge was packed full and extra chairs were being brought in for the Installation this year. The Sederunt Book tells us that 116 brethren signed into the meeting; it's my belief that at least another 30 or so sneaked in because the crowd was much bigger than 116.

Anyway, irrespective of the actual number present, a great atmosphere was created for the ongoings. Those present were treated to a truly excellent ceremony, in the best traditions of No. XII, led by Principal Installing Master Bro Hector Macphail PM and his two assistants Bro. Robert J. Bain PM and Bro. Brian McFadyen IPM. The new Master Bro. James P. Livingstone had made an inspired selection when he chose his team. As is customary we were joined on the evening by the Provost of Inverclyde and, as the present incumbent Drew McKenzie is a Past Master of Lodge Crawfurdsburn Greenock No. 1121, we had the great pleasure of his company at the Ceremony as well as the dinner which followed, supplied by First Choice Catering.

The usual Loyal and Masonic Toasts were observed and we were entertained, in song, by Bro. Alan D. Beck PM and Bro. Ndukwe Ibe and the Provost addressed us, drawing on the very close links between No. XII and the municipality of Greenock stretching back to 1765 when Lord Cathcart instructed that the Lodge should have the right to meet in the new Town Hall, conferring the right through the feu charter. The brethren of the Lodge had made significant financial contributions to the funding of the new building.

The proceedings ended by the hour of low twelve with the hearty singing of *Auld Lang Syne*. Then, as Bro. Robert Burns put it in *The Twa Dogs*,
