Bro John Clarke Glenny PM
28th November 1941 – 15th December 2019



We were all saddened when Past Master John Clarke Glenny – or Jack as he was known to us all – passed to his rest and reward in the early hours of Sunday 15th December 2019, aged 78. Jack had been steadfastly battling ill health since last January. Indeed, it was at the Annual Celebration of The Greenock Burns Club (The Mother Club) that Jack first spoke to some of us in the Lodge to let us know of his diagnosis and what lay ahead of him. The battle ended when Jack slipped peacefully over to The Grand Lodge Above.

Jack was brought up with his brother Alistair in the family home in Greenock's Bow Road. He attended Lady Alice Primary School at Barr's Cottage and, being a clever boy, passed his 'Quali' and went to Greenock High School in Dunlop Street. He left school to become a banker with the Clydesdale Bank. Despite successfully negotiating the hurdles of his banking exams it was a career that was never for Jack. He found true

happiness at work when he joined HM Customs and Excise. Jack worked all over the country for the Customs.

On 27 January 1974, the Greek registered sugar boat *Captayannis* was waiting at the Tail of the Bank to deliver sugar to the James Watt Dock in Greenock. Jack was in charge of a Customs team doing a routine inspection when the weather worsened, and he made the decision to return to shore. It was a wise one as it turned out, because later that evening a severe storm caused the vessel to drag her anchor. Her Captain ordered the engines to be started with the intention of running for the more sheltered waters of the Gareloch but before she could be brought to power she drifted onto the taut anchor chains of the BP tanker *British Light*. The tanker suffered no damage, but her anchor chains holed the sugar boat below the waterline, allowing water to pour in. *Captayannis's* Captain, realising that water was flowing in so fast that she was in imminent danger of sinking, opted to beach her in the shallow waters over the sandbank and steered to the desired spot where she stuck fast. As she rolled over all of the crew, and finally the Captain, were

rescued. The ship ultimately succumbed the next morning, rolling onto her side. She has lain there ever since. Professionally, Jack also had the harrowing experience of being involved in the aftermath of the Lockerbie bombing of 21st December 1988, when 243 passengers, 16 crew members and 11 people on the ground lost their lives.

Jack was proposed into No. XII by his wife Elizabeth's father and he was Initiated on 2nd April 1963. Being an expert communicator, the ceremonial work of the Craft came readily to Jack and he progressed through the offices until he was Installed in the Chair on 17th November 1981. He was re-installed in 1982. Uniquely, his brother Alistair was following Jack through the ranks. They served as Deacons and Wardens together and Alistair followed Jack into the Chair in 1983. Jack received his 50 Year Diploma from Bro. Alan D. Beck RWM on 2nd April 2013, 50 years to the day from his Initiation. After leaving the Chair, Jack served the Lodge as a Past Master,



Installing Master and conducted the Annual Divine Service on numerous occasions. He also presided at dedication and re-dedication ceremonies in the Lodge, for example the new Masters' Boards and Lodge Hymn Books. In November 2018, he conducted the Act of Remembrance at the Lodge's Great War Commemoration meeting. He proposed the Immortal Memory at the Lodge Charity Burns Supper in 2014 and was the inaugural Honorary President of the Lodge Greenock Kilwinning No. XII Burns Club when it was formed in February 2019.

A lifelong member of St Margaret's Church, Jack served as an elder for over 50 years and was a Reader of The Church of Scotland. He conducted services around the country, often spending time in remote communities, the Isle of Colonsay being an example. In 2009, Jack was invited to address the Scottish Parliament at their "Time for Reflection" which is held at the beginning of each new session. Jack was Moderator of the Greenock and Paisley Presbytery in 2006, the first lay person to fulfil this role.



Of course, Jack was a multi-talented individual. In his younger days, he served as an assistant Scout Leader with the 45th and 80th Troops. He was a good footballer in his youth playing for the famous Port Glasgow Rangers. A keen freshwater angler, he was a Past President of Dunrod Angling Club and also could invariably be found at Cappielow Park for the home games, as he was an avid Morton supporter.

Perhaps it was in the world of poetry, particularly that of Robert Burns where Jack's greatest hobby lay. A Burns Speaker of international renown, he spoke at Burns Suppers and gatherings all over the world, particularly in Canada where he was a freeman of several cities. Jack was an engaging speaker with his ready, sharp sense of humour and ability to maintain the interest of his audience ensuring success and acclamation wherever he performed. His interest in Burns led him to the Greenock Burns Club (The Mother Club) and he served as President in 1993. He was, for many years, the Club's Bard using his talent to pen a few verses for important Club occasions.



Jack had the unique honour of being invited to propose the Toast to the Immortal Memory at the Mother Club's Annual Celebration in 2010 thereby becoming the Club's Honorary President for a year. The honour is unique because it is not customary for a club member to propose this Toast; it certainly was the first time in living memory.



Jack's life was celebrated at a service in St Margaret's Church and then at the Greenock Crematorium on Saturday 21st December 2019. St Margaret's having no minister at present, the services were conducted by the Interim Moderator, Rev. Teri Peterson of St. John's, Gourock. Both services were uplifting as she highlighted the positive impact that Jack had on so many during his life. There was laughter too, which was very appropriate. I for one, never met Jack in the 50 years or so that I knew him but that he had me laughing at some point in the conversation! Jack's brother Alistair poignantly read the poem *A Scots Farewell* at the Church. It seemed to sum everything up as did Robert Burns's *Epitaph on a Friend* which was also printed in the Order of Service.

*Few hearts like his with virtue warm'd
Few heads with knowledge so informed:
If there's another world, he lives in bliss;
If there is none, he made the best of this.*

Jack is survived and dearly missed by his wife Elizabeth, his sons Calum and Andrew, their wives and the grandchildren. Jack will also be dearly missed by his brother Alistair and his family. Our thoughts and prayers are with them all in this time of sadness.

From the Old Minute Books

I am currently involved in some research regarding the Lodge in the 1850s for a contribution to another journal, and, as part of the task, I have been reading, and transcribing, the minutes for all 6 meetings of the Lodge that were held in 1859. The first of these is below in transcription. It is exactly as in the Minute Book. I have not added any punctuation, altered any spellings etc. It does make an interesting read.

Amongst those attending are Bo. Wm. Macclure (or McClure – spelled both ways in the Minute) the RW Master and Bros. John Scott Jnr. who had been Master in 1855 and FR Reid, Master in 1856. John Scott Yst (presumably youngest) was also there as was John F McKay who would be Master in 1860. The Scotts were of the shipbuilding family and presumably father and son. John Scott Yst never took the Chair. The next, and final, Scott in the Chair was Bro. RL Scott in 1906.

At a meeting of the Lodge Greenock Kilwinning held within the Royal Hotel Greenock on the evening of 4th Jany 1859 at eight O'clock

The Lodge having been duly opened the minutes of the last meeting¹ were read and approved. Bro Latham then proposed that Bro John M Johnson be received as an affiliated brother of the Lodge and Bro Sicklemore proposed Bro Albert Law Bro Cuthbert Le Mesurier Bro AA Albert-anson in a similar manner which was carried unanimously. Bro Sicklemore then proposed Mr Edwards, acting Paymaster to HMS Hogue, seconded by Bro Johnson as a fit and proper candidate for admission to the Lodge. The Office Bearers elected at the last meeting were then duly installed by Bro RF (sic) Reid. Bro FR Reid then presented the Lodge with the Star of his jewel. Bro Latham proposed and Bro Sicklemore seconded that the state of our account with the Grand Lodge of Scotland be looked into and put on a satisfactory footing which the RWM agreed to have done by consulting with our late Secy. and report. Bro Ironson brought under the notice of the Lodge that some brothers made many months ago had not yet received their diplomas. Bro Latham proposed, seconded by Bro Scott and carried unanimously that Bro Mackay be authorised to arrange to 150 copies of Lodge diplomas on Vellum similar to the old plate to be thrown off. (The plate to be the property of the Lodge) Bro Maxton in a very handsome manner intimated his intention to present the Lodge with an old and honourable emblem that had done duty at Waterloo as our future state sword after partaking of refreshments

and the usual Loyal and Brotherly toasts having been drunk the Lodge closed in all harmony and due Masonic order.

I Held the Royal Hotel Greenock at 8pm on Friday 17th December 1858

It was a busy evening, with 4 affiliations and a proposal for admission/initiation. The Office Bearers were installed. Bro. Bro FR Reid then presented the Lodge with the Star of his jewel – and if anyone can tell me what this means, I would be delighted to hear!! There was obviously something amiss with the Grand Lodge and our payments which was discussed. The need for diplomas was dealt with to the first stage and finally a promise of a sword that had ‘served’ at Waterloo. All of this was achieved before the Harmony was embarked upon. The brethren obviously worked hard back then!


Lapel Badges
