Well, certainly I would not wish to disagree with the reasoning behind his famous quote but I might take issue with the percentages suggested. I think everyone needs a little bit of inspiration in their lives from time to time. I wonder what inspires you brethren or perhaps I should also ask the question, who inspires you?

Too often, I fear that the young people of today, draw their inspiration from the wrong sources,

I watch with huge disappointment as sportsmen and women cheat their way to success byusing performance enhancing drugs. I watch with disgust as overpaid footballers, cheat and
try to get their opponents sent off, seemingly incapable of moving the shortest distance
without spitting or swearing at the referee. Popstars with their lavish lifestyles, spending
money as if it is going out of fashion concerned only with themselves and not with others.

There are, of course, exceptions to this rule but they seem to be so few and far between and I can think of the example of Steven Naismith, a well-paid footballer but who still gives of his time and talents to assist with the homeless in Glasgow, not just financially but giving freely of his time to serve food to those most in need.

During the week, one of the programmes I managed to catch, was one about the KINDERTRANSPORT, which told the story of how Sir Nicholas Winton, organised the safe passage of a total of 669 Czech children out of the country to safety, shortly before the outbreak of the Second World War in 1938. Yet his story only came to light, when his wife discovered an old scrapbook nearly 50 years later and the story unfolded of his good work.

Sir Nicholas Winton died on the 1st July 2015 at the age of 106 and I understand that there are plans to commemorate his life with a Service sometime this year. What a wonderfully inspirational figure. An example of selflessness and humility which marks him out as a real hero.

Inspiration can also come from the unlikeliest of sources as well. Think of the brother who never misses a meeting and while perhaps not taking a major role in the ritual, is quite content to carry out unseen work in the background, often without acknowledgement and praise.

I sincerely hope that many of you will join with us at the meeting to recognise the outstanding service of this truly inspirational freemason.

One last thought before I finish – I opened this ramble with a quote from Albert Einstein, so I will close with another for you to bear in mind; "Try not to become a man of success but rather try to become a man of value".

CHARITY ZIP LINE CHALLENGE.



I am pleased to be able to confirm that following my request for "volunteers" to take part in this event, I received names from Lodges XII, 175, 217, 626, 1121 and 1425. At first the Province was only allocated 5 spaces but after an impassioned plea to the chief organiser, this has been increased to ten spaces. My thanks go to all who submitted their names and those not selected will be placed on a reserve list in case more spaces become available but the lucky ones taking part are;

Following registration (cost £50 which covers the running costs of the event), each participant will be asked to raise a further £200 which, if achieved, will realise the target total of between £30,000 - £35,000.

The event will take place on Saturday 14½ May with participants assembling on the south side of the Clyde near the BBC offices, where they will be harnessed up before making their way on foot across the bridge to the Finnieston crane. There they will be hoisted up to a height of around 150 feet in a basket before being attached to the wire and launched back across the river. Simple!

Brethren it is hoped that ALL of the lodges and individual brethren will embrace this effort and whether your lodge has a brother taking part or not, that you will all lend your very best support to the challenge.

Stocks of the new member's booklet have now been distributed to all Lodges for presentation to new initiates.

Test Fees:

Please be reminded that it is important that Test Fees are kept up to date. Most Lodges now offer the facility of paying by direct debit which is an excellent way of ensuring that you are always clear in your Lodge. In particular, it is also important to make sure that if you are an affiliate member of another Lodge, you must be clear in ALL Lodges in which you are a member to ensure that you may continue to visit other Lodges. Brethren who are not up to date in all Lodges have visiting rights withdrawn as well as the privileges which would normally be afforded to them in their Mother Lodges.

Capitation:

Brethren should be aware that the Capitation Fee has now been increased to £30 per active member as per the recent membership return. This is the first increase in three years and it is hoped that, if approved, this rate will be fixed for a three-year period. It may be appropriate for some Lodges to now consider whether their TEST FEES continue to be at an appropriate level.

Other Fees:

I

Brethren, in particular, the trustees of the various Lodges, should be aware that a Notice of Motion is currently before Grand Lodge, which if approved at the February communication will result in an increase in fees payable.

This virtually replaces the First Schedule of the Constitution and Laws and amongst the changes would see:

- The minimum fees payable by members (Test Fee) rise from £25 to £30.
- The direct contribution for each initiate payable to Grand Lodge rise from £70 to £90.
- The fees payable by Lodges on behalf of each initiate to Provincial Grand Lodge rise from £5 to £10 and the annual fee to Provincial Grand Lodge rise from £50 to £60.

In addition, the minimum initiation fee would rise from £130 to £150, affiliation fees from £70 to £90 and the mark fee from £25 to £35.

I would stress that the above is simply a synopsis of the various changes and trustees should refer to the billets issued by Grand Lodge for full details.

This Notice of Motion will be considered at the February communication of Grand Lodge and should your Lodge have any opinion on the various changes, that is the forum where these will be discussed.

Jubilee Certificate (report by Right Worshipful Master Brother Paul Docherty).

At our meeting on January 13th 2016, I was personally delighted to present a Jubilee certificate to Brother Arthur Scott Boyle. Bro Boyle was initiated in Lodge Sir Michael on November the 10th 1965.

He was the son of Arthur Scott Boyle senior who also was a member of Lodge Sir Michael and he, like his son, was born and bred in Kilmacolm. Arthur senior was born in 1916, just 11 years after our Lodge was even constituted, and became a member of the Lodge as soon as circumstances and discharges from the services allowed, and was initiated on April 24th 1946.

He was very proud of the day his son Arthur junior was initiated into his Mother Lodge in 1965, and was even more delighted when the first of his grandsons, Bro Roderick Boyle, was also initiated into Lodge Sir Michael on December 10th 1980. Thereafter, he was then the proud proposer of his second Grandson initiated in September 1983, the current RWM. Me!


