Education, Education, Education

Away back on 23rd May 2001, whilst seeking a second term in office, Rt Hon Tony Blair, The Prime Minister, was launching Labour's election manifesto at the University of Southampton. In his speech he said, "Our top priority was, is and always will be education, education, education." More recently, on 18th August 2015, Scotland's First Minister told education leaders in a keynote speech that education would be her priority during her next term in office. She said, "Let me be clear – I want to be judged on this. If you are not, as First Minister, prepared to put your neck on the line on the education of our young people then what are you prepared to do? It really matters."

It really matters. The leaders in our country put a great emphasis on the value of, and need for, education. So where do we stand in the craft? Where are we as far as masonic education is concerned? I really do wonder.

At No. XII's last meeting we had the annual Jack and Alistair Glenny Memorial Lecture. RWM Bro. Brian McFadyen and I delivered 2 short lectures on colourful characters who were members of No. XII in the second half of the 19th Century viz. Bros.

Joseph George Shanks and John Cony Sicklemore. It should have been an interesting evening and the 31 brethren who attended (21 from No. XII and 10 visitors) seemed to find it so. However, this attendance was very much smaller than usual. Many of our regular attenders were noticeable by their absence. And why? Personally, I think it was because it WAS a Lecture and NOT a degree. However, I believe that there is much more to Freemasonry than working degrees and churning out Master Masons from a production line. Back in the 1920s and 30s it was relatively common in No. XII for lectures to be part of the proceedings. They were not exclusively on Masonic topics either.

I also question the validity, indeed the whole point, of Exemplifications, unless they are by a Lodge visiting from another Constitution. In my view, they are a pointless exercise. There is no atmosphere generated, ritual presentation suffers consequently and often the poor 'candidate' is embarrassed when he cannot remember the answers to questions that he is asked!

I have heard it said that Exemplifications are 'good practice' for the degree workers. Such training works far better when coaching and advice can be given at the time during a rehearsal session.

Several years ago, we vowed in No. XII that never again would we hold an exemplification. Even at the last minute, most Past Masters could give an interesting, impromptu talk about their experiences over their years in the Lodge. A contribution to masonic education beats the exemplification every time. Just saying...

Our Previous Meeting Tuesday 17th January 2023 The Jack and Alistair Glenny Memorial Lecture

It was a time of great sadness a couple of years ago when our Past Masters, the Brothers Glenny – Jack and Alistair- passed to the Grand Lodge Above within weeks of each other. The Lodge determined that their memory would be commemorated by the naming the annual January lecture after them. This was felt to be appropriate because between them they had a great interest in historical matters and consummate skills in communication.

This year we had 2 mini-lectures, based on 2 brethren of No. XII who had been active in the second half of the 19th Century, Bros. Joseph George Shanks (1831-1911) and John Cony Sicklemore (1801-67). Both served their country – Shanks as a Major in the Royal Marines and Sicklemore as a Captain in the Royal Navy - and almost certainly a services' posting to the Greenock area led to each becoming a member of No. XII.

Bro. Sicklemore was present in the Lodge when Joseph George Shanks was Initiated as may be seen in the Minute extract below.

At a meeting of the Lodge Greenock Kilwinning No 11/12 held in the Royal Hotel Greenock on the evening of Thursday the ninth of December 1858 at eight o'clock

The Lodge having been opened in due Masonic form proceeded to the Initiation after being proposed by Brother Herriot and seconded by Brother McKay of Capt. Peter Maxton and Lieut Joseph Shanks RM of HMS Hogue who were duly entered apprentices and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Masons. It was then proposed by Brother John Scott Jnr, seconded Br McKay and unanimously carried that as the period had now arrived for the election of office Bearers for next year that a meeting of this Lodge shall be called by circular for that purpose for the evening of Tuesday 14th inst. At eight o'clock in the Royal Hotel after the usual Loyal and Brotherly toasts, the Lodge was closed in due Masonic Form.

On 10th February 1874, Bro. Shanks presented the set of Tracing Boards to the Lodge that are still in use today. Unfortunately, the Minutes of that year are not to hand but our RW Master Bro. Brian McFadyen found a letter in the periodical *The Freemason* relevant to the Tracing Boards whilst browsing on the internet. It is reproduced below.

GREENOCK .- Kilwinning Lodge (No. 12.)-A special meeting of this old and very flourishing ludge took place on the roth inst., when a large number of the brethren assembled to do honour to the occasion, the business of the evening being the presentation to the lodge of a beautiful and costly set of tracing boards by Bro. Captain Shanks, Knight of the Imperial Order of the Medjidie, P. Prov. Grand Warden of Devon, &c. When the lodge had been opened in the first degree, the W.M. called on Bro. Shanks, who then addressed the meeting as follows :-- Worshipful Master, Wardens, and brethree, a little more than fifteen years ago I and the honour and privilege of being initiated into Freemasonry in the body of this lodge, and although I have been separated from it for some time in consequence of being in Her Majesty's Service, although I have met with a truly fraternal welcome in every lodge I have visited or belonged to ; although elsewhere I have attained a high position in all the degrees; yet I have

Instituted in 1851, the Order of the Medjidie was issued in considerable numbers by Sultan Abdülmecid as a reward for distinguished service to members of the British Army and the Royal Navy and the French Army who came to the aid of the Ottoman Empire during the Crimean War against Russia.

Bro. Shanks received this Order.

present in his mind, "What can I do for the lodge which has done so much for me?" He must be constantly saying to himself—

" I never enough can honour her

" Who, past all bounds, has honoured me." Some few, indeed, there may be who will say "we pay for what we get, and there is no need to do more than that;" but, brethren, I hold that if the sum demanded from candidates for admission to our mysteries was a hundred fold more than it is, that amount even would be no equivalent for the inestimable advantage of being Freemasons; and I therefore, think we all ought to do as much as possible for our lodge. these views in my mind, and after long consideration, I came to the conclusion that a set of tracing boards was most orgently needed in this lodge for the instruction of the brethren, and I now beg to offer these for your acceptance. [The boards were here unveiled and their splendid appearance draw forth long and loud plaudits from the brethren]. Bro. Shanks continued-I trust these tracing boards may be considered worthy of this lodge, and that their presence here will induce some of the brethren to study the science of Freemasonry more than they have hitherto done, and to search more deeply into the beautiful mysteries of its esoteric teachings, for we should ever remember that one may be thoroughly well versed in the ritual, may be well-informed in our secret means of communication, and yet be only on the very threshold of the science. All the beauty, all the knowledge being within, but still freely open to that Master who would search for them properly, aided by the light of the sacred volume; and it has ever been found that the more we know of Freemasonry, the better we understand its wonderful power for good, the more do we appreciate and love it. In the hope then that these tracing boards may conduce (even in a small degree) to the welfare of this lodge, I now ask your acceptance of them, A hearty and cordial vote of thanks was given to Bro. Shanks for his handsome present; and he then, by request of the W.M., delivered the lecture on the first tracing board in a manner highly gratifying to his audience, and was listened to with that close and interested attention which the Masonic lectures always command when ably delivered. This is the first time a lecture of this kind has ever been given in this lodge; the task being by no means an easy one, very few are willing to undertake it. At the close of the lecture Bro. Shanks was greeted with prolonged and rapturous applause. On one of the tracing boards is fixed an elegant silver plate, bearing the following inscription: "Presented to his Mother Lodge, Greenock Kilwilling, No. 12, by Bro. Captain Shanks, K.M., Royal Marines Light Infantry, Past Master of 139, E.R.; Past Prov. Grand Warden of Devon, 1874.






HMS La Hogue

HMS La Hogue was a 74-gun third-rate ship of the line of the Royal Navy, launched on 3 October 1811 at Deptford. She was named after the 1692 Battle of La Hogue and was converted into a screw-propelled steamship frigate in 1850. From 1852 she acted as a guard-ship at Devonport under the command of Captain William Ramsay and saw her final service, still under Ramsay, on duties in the Baltic Sea during the Crimean War. On 18 September 1855, she ran aground off Renskär, Sweden and was severely damaged. She was refloated with the assistance of three gunboats after her lower deck guns were taken out.

She was eventually broken up in 1865. JG Shanks was serving on La Hogue when he joined No XII.



HMS *Princess Royal* (left) was a 91-gun ship of the Royal Navy. JCS (right) was made her Captain in 1854. Completed in 1853, she was disposed of in 1872. JCS commanded her when she took part in the bombarding of Sevastopol in the Crimean War.

Bro. Shanks is hadsomely kitted out in the photo but not, I think, as a Captain in the Royal Navy!





The grave of Bro. John Cony Sicklemore in Greenock Cemetery The inscription on the stone reads

> John Cony Sicklemore Captain R.N. Born 28th November 1801 Died 20th December 1867

Erected by a few brother officers and friends Greenock 1869

They both had a big impact on the Lodge and the community although neither sat in the Chair. Bro. Shanks is buried in Edinburgh and Bro. Sicklemore in Greenock (above).




From Bygone Days (3) The Lodge Artefacts


266th Anniversary Meeting and Annual Burns Supper 2023
